## **Ever changing interior - abstract**

Arts and Crafts is a common theme of Haifa's neighborhoods, especially among the younger generations. We decided to make arts as the main occupation in Talpiots' spaces for several reasons; first, the dynamics and livelihood that art brings to any given space. Second, we believe that by encouraging younger generations to come to Haifa in general and to Talpiot building in particular, we can bring this place to become more alive, and hopefully crowded with creators and crafters.

The concept we chose is the scaffolding system. The scaffolding method stands out due to it's flexibility, adaptability, and temporarily, which allows us to occupy any space inside the building without making any harm to it's outlook.

In addition, scaffolding system is characterized by it's simplicity, which means it's easy to disassemble and vice versa, this allows any citizen or visitor to participate and also to make it dynamic and flexible for future changes.

The structure is built from several light materials such as thin metals, and Lego-like pieces that serves as connectors, which makes it easy to build.

We chose to place the structure mainly in the center of the building in order to make it public and to allow a view over the galleries of the existing building and also to allow a view from the galleries inside the art studios, which we designed in a way that will allow diverse situations between completely exposure and direct contact with the artists and privacy on the other hand.

At last, the decision to put the scaffolding system inside when it's generally put outside makes the interior space more lively and more city like. We hope that as the scaffolding use works daily when it fixed from the external side of the building, the use of the inner scaffolding system will help to cure Talpiot current situation, and by that will mend its image and promote the art and social need.
